Richard van Camp is a Canadian story writer, who was born in Fort Smith, Northwest Territories in Canada, on the 8. September 1971. His nationality is Tlicho, also known as Dogrib, which is an ethnolinguistic group living in the Northwest of Canada. He started writing when he was only 19 years old because he noticed no one was writing about his home, the Northwest Territories, so he wanted to tell his stories. He then graduated from the En'owkin International School of Writing, the University of Victoria's Creative Writing and got a Master's Degree in Creative Writing at the University of British Columbia. Richard is now a storyteller and best-selling author who is internationally known. He does not just write for adults, he also wrote some children books, for example his first one: What's the most beautiful thing you know about horses? He is especially known for his short-story collections. Richard van Camp has already done a lot of different things, for example writing for the CBS's North of 60 television show, which is a Canadian television drama, for about two months. He also taught creative writing at the University of British Columbia. He also won some awards such as the NSK Neustadt Prize, which is an international children's literary award founded in the year 2003, in June 2014 for Children's Literature. 2015, he then was awarded for the R. Ross Arnett Award again for Children's Literature for Little You, which he wrote on the 1st of April, 2013.

"Man babies" is also a short-story by Richard van Camp and will also be my topic of this essay. The book is about a twenty-eight-year-old man, his mom Karen and her boyfriend Steve. The young man is still living at home and doing nothing except playing video games. And then there is his mom, who does everything for him and still calls him Baby, as if he is five years old. Steve wants Baby to have his own place, as Steve wants to move in together with Karen, but the overprotective mother does not want Baby to leave. One day, Steve had enough. When he arrived at home, he saw Baby sitting on the couch with his Xbox. The baby just looked at Steve telling him he should cook because he is hungry. And then Steve began yelling and he told Baby he has five minutes to leave the house with all his stuff. And then he explained to Karen, who came home later, that the most amazing thing happened: Baby decided to start his own life. She did not believe him and wanted to call her son
