The English version of the curriculum for the "Doctoral programme (PhD) Faculty of Catholic Theology" unfolds no legal effects and is for information purposes only. The legal basis is regulated in the curriculum published in the University of Innsbruck Bulletin on 22 April 2009, issue 69, No. 261.

Decision of the Curriculum Committee of the Faculty of Catholic Theology on 24.03.2009, approved by Senate Decree on 16.04.2009:

On the basis of § 25 para. 1 no. 10 University Organisation Act 2002, BGBl. I (Federal Law Gazette) No. 120, most recently amended by Federal Law BGBl. I (Federal Law Gazette) No. 134/2008 and § 32 Section "Regulations of Study Law", republished in the University of Innsbruck Bulletin of 3 February 2006, Issue 16, No. 90, most recently amended by the University of Innsbruck Bulletin of 7 May 2008, Issue 42, No. 272, the following is decreed:

Curriculum for the Doctoral programme (PhD) Faculty of Catholic Theology at the Faculty of Catholic Theology of the University of Innsbruck

§ 1 Qualification profile and programme objectives

- (1) The Doctoral programme (PhD) Faculty of Catholic Theology belongs to the group of theological studies.
- (2) The Doctoral programme (PhD) Faculty of Catholic Theology is a joint study programme of Catholic pedagogy of religion and philosophy at the Faculty of Catholic Theology. Graduates are able to academically elaborate on and present philosophical and/or religious pedagogical problems on a high level of subject-matter and methodology, and to recognise their practical relevance.

The Doctoral programme (PhD) Faculty of Catholic Theology specifically deepens and consolidates the graduates' communicative and interdisciplinary competences, as well as their understanding of the theory of science and didactics; special consideration is given to basic human questions of *Weltanschauung* and a responsible treatment of faith and religion in the public life of the church and of society. The programme guides students towards independent and creative practical academic work and is meant to be the first step of an academic career.

The focus of the programme includes the acquisition of knowledge in the disciplines required for a successful pursuit of the dissertation; of competences in self-perception and self-assessment; competences in the area of academic teaching and learning as well as the presentation of academic results in public; this also includes linguistic, communicative, as well as planning and managerial competences.

- (3) Depending on the topic chosen for the dissertation, the dissertation will focus on questions of philosophy or religious pedagogy. This includes well-founded academic orientation knowledge with respect to
 - a survey of current themes in philosophical research,

- philosophy in the context of the discussion with other sciences, and
- and especially with respect to the fact that philosophical thinking leads to argumentatively well-founded and academically responsible convictions in questions of "Weltanschauung";

and/or

- the independent perception, assessment and further development of theories and concepts in the field of religious pedagogy and theology,
- the competence to develop complex topics according to the state of the art in the relevant disciplines and by employing one's methods in a theologically reflected manner,
- using the connection between theory and practice for generating academic insight,
- reflection on the tension-charged unity of faith and teaching, of dogma and practice,
- the awareness of the relationship between form and matter with respect to teaching and research in religious pedagogy,
- the development of an academic-theological capability of discernment through the integration of the knowledge gained into one's personality.
- (4) The Doctoral programme (PhD) Faculty of Catholic Theology qualifies graduates for professional careers which require the application of special academic knowledge and methods. In particular, it qualifies graduates to pursue academic careers, to teach at universities and other academic institutions, and to conduct academic work, especially in an interdisciplinary context and/or in basic research. The programme qualifies for leadership positions in these areas, but also in fields which require academically well-founded orientation knowledge, the special competence of critical analysis and the ability to take an argumentatively plausible and academically responsible position, as well as theological judgment and didactic competences, for example for occupations within the church, in the areas of education, publishing, and administration, in teacher training, consulting, communication and media work, in public administration, and in private business.

§ 2 Length and scope

The duration of the Doctoral programme (PhD) Faculty of Catholic Theology is three years (six semesters); this equals 180 ECTS credits.

§ 3 Admission

- (1) Valid proof of the necessary academic level for admission to the doctoral programme must be provided. This includes proof of the completion of relevant diploma or master programmes, or completion of relevant diploma or Magister programmes at a university of applied science or completion of other equivalent studies at an accredited Austrian or non-Austrian post-secondary educational institution. If equivalency is given in principle, and only a few elements are missing for full equivalency, the rector's office is entitled to condition the determination of equivalency on the obligation to pass certain examinations in the course of the doctoral programme.
- (2) Relevant studies include in any case the completion of the Master Programme Philosophy at the Faculty of Catholic Theology or the Master Catholic Religious Pedagogy of the University of Innsbruck or the Academic Teacher Training Programme with Diploma Thesis in the School

Subject of Catholic Religion.

§ 4 Types of courses and maximum number of students per course

- (1) Lectures (VO) are courses which convey content in the form of presentations.
- (2) Courses with continuous performance assessment:
 - 1. **Seminars (SE)** focus on a thematically limited subject area and emphasize academic work in communication and cooperation. The maximum number of participants is 20.
 - 2. **Research seminars (FO)** focus on the joint elaboration of an academic topic, on academic discussion, and on cooperation in the group with special consideration of the current research literature. The maximum number of participants is 18.
 - 3. **Cooperative seminars (SK)** are interdisciplinary courses whose special characteristic is that they are taught in cooperation by a minimum of two instructors from different subject areas. The maximum number of participants is 18.

§ 5 Procedure for the allotment of places in courses with a limited number of participants

Students whose study time will be prolonged if they are not admitted are to be given priority.

§ 6 Modules

§ 7 Dissertation

- (1) In the course of the Doctoral programme (PhD) Faculty of Catholic Theology, a dissertation has to be written, which equals 120 ECTS credits. The dissertation is an academic thesis which in contrast to a diploma or master thesis serves to prove the student's ability to cope with scientific questions in an independent way.
- (2) The dissertation topic has to be chosen from the fields of philosophy or Catholic religious pedagogy and is to be defined in the dissertation agreement.
- (3) The student has to propose a team of supervisors, consisting of at least two persons (dissertation committee), and to nominate one of them as the main supervisor. It is permissible to also propose supervisors (with the exception of the main supervisor) from subject-related fields.
- (4) Prior to beginning the work, the student has to communicate the dissertation topic and names of the supervisors in writing to the Director of Studies. Topic and supervisors are considered as accepted, unless the Director of Studies vetoes them by means of a decree within one month after the receipt of the proposal.

§ 8 Examination regulations

- (1) The evaluation of Mandatory Modules 1 3 and 5 and of Elective Modules 1 3 is based on course examinations.
- (2) Lectures are evaluated by means of a single exam at the end of the course. The lecturer is required to communicate evaluation methods (oral and/or written) before the course starts.

- (3) The evaluation of courses with continuous performance assessment is based on the student's regular, written and/or oral contributions. The lecturer is required to communicate evaluation methods and criteria before the course starts.
- (4) Mandatory Module 4 is evaluated by the main supervisor on the basis of a performance report written by the student. A positive grade has to read "participated with success"; a negative grade has to read "participated without success".
- (5) The evaluation of Mandatory Module 6 " Defense of the Dissertation" is based on an oral exam taken before an examination board consisting of at least three examiners.

§ 9 Academic degree

Graduates of the Doctoral programme (PhD) Faculty of Catholic Theology are awarded the academic degree of "Doctor of Philosophy" or "PhD", in brief.

§ 10 Implementation

This curriculum comes into force on 1 October 2009.
