Curriculum for the

Master's Programme Philosophy

at the Faculty of Philosophy and History of the University of Innsbruck

§ 1 Qualification profile

- (1) The Master's Programme Philosophy is included in the group of study programmes of Humanities and Cultural Sciences.
- (2) The Master's Programme Philosophy complements the Bachelor's Programme Philosophy including further sub-disciplines of Philosophy, consolidating the students' philosophical knowledge in terms of Theoretical Philosophy and Practical Philosophy as well as emphasizing Intercultural Philosophy and Applied Ethics. It leads to independent, critical examination of the development of history of ideas and culture as well as contemporary currents of Philosophy. The interests developed during the Bachelor's programme may be followed further and related to other questions. Besides, the necessary skills for scientific work in the field of Philosophy are completed and perfected.
- (3) The Master's Programme Philosophy aims at further scientific education and is moreover the precondition for passing a doctoral study programme. It provides a particular knowledge and skills that facilitate professional perspectives in different fields of occupation. Graduates of the Master's Programme in Philosophy excel in dealing with new challenges and using their analytic and communicative skills in different fields. Typical fields of work for philosophers are in universities or in their surrounding environment, in scientific, cultural and social fields as well as in the media, politics and economy.

§ 2 Scope and duration

The Master's Programme Philosophy covers 120 ECTS-Credits and has therefore a duration of four semesters.

§ 3 Admission

- (1) The admission requirement for the Master's Programme Philosophy is having completed a relevant bachelor's programme at a university or university of applied sciences or an equivalent study programme at a recognized post-secondary educational institution in Austria or abroad.
- (2) A relevant Bachelor's programme is in any case the Bachelor's Programme Philosophy at the Faculty of Humanities I at the University of Innsbruck or the Bachelor's Programme Philosophy at the Faculty of Catholic Theology.

- (3) In the event that equivalence has been established in principle but with certain qualifications missing for full equivalence, supplemental examinations may be required by the rectorate. These examinations must be passed during the respective master's programme.

§ 4 Types of courses and maximum number of students per course

- (1) **Lectures** (VO) are courses held in lecture format and courses without continuous performance assessment. They introduce the research areas, methods and schools of thought for a given subject.
- (2) **Seminars** (SE) are courses with continuous performance assessment and provide in-depth treatment of scientific topics through students' presentations and discussion thereof. Maximum number of participants: 20.

§ 5 Allocation of places in courses with a limited number of participants

Admission to courses with a limited number of participants is allocated as follows:

1. Students for whom the study duration would be extended due to the postponement are to be given priority.
2. If the criterion in No. 1 does not suffice, first, students who pass this course as part of a compulsory module come first, then students that pass the course as part of an elective module.
3. If the criteria in No. 1 and No. 2 do not suffice, then the places are raffled.

Prerequisites: The requirements specified by the respective curricula must be met.			

8. Individual Choice of Specialisation (20 ECTS-Credits) / Minor

For individual specialisation modules of the curricula of the Master's programmes of the University of Innsbruck corresponding to 20 ECTS-Credits can be freely selected. It is recommended to select modules from related fields, such as the Master's Programme Philosophy at the Faculty of Catholic Theology or fields related to the topic of the Master's Thesis. The prerequisites specified by the respective curricula must be met.

Instead of the compulsory module according to § 7 par. 1 no. 7 (Interdisciplinary Skills) and the Individual Choice of Specialisation according to § 7 par. 1 no. 8, a Minor for Bachelor's Programmes can be completed according to free places. Minors are defined modules from other subject disciplines amounting to 30 ECTS-Credits; they are announced in the University of Innsbruck's Bulletin.

§ 8 Master's Thesis

- (1) Within the Master's programme, a Master's Thesis with a scope of 20 ECTS-AP shall be elaborated. The Master's Thesis is a scientific piece of work that proves the ability to work on a scientific topic independently and in a justifiable way in terms of content and methodology.
- (2) The topic of the Master's Thesis shall be taken from the field of Philosophy.
- (3) The student has the right to propose a topic for his/her Master's Thesis or choose a topic out of a number of proposals.
- (4) The student has the right to write his/her Master's Thesis in a foreign language if the supervisor's consent is provided.
- (5) The Master's Thesis has to be presented in writing as well as in the electronic form specified by the Director of Studies.

§ 9 Examination regulations

- (1) All modules except the modules “Master’s Thesis Defence” and “Preparation of the Master’s Thesis” are completed by successful completion of the courses included.
- (2) The compulsory module “Preparation of the Master’s Thesis” is evaluated by the supervisor of the Master’s Thesis based on an abstract. Positive evaluation reads “successfully completed”, negative evaluation “unsuccessfully completed”.
- (3) Course examinations are:
 1. Examinations that prove the knowledge and skills provided by a certain lecture, with the assessment taking place in a single examination at the end of the lecture. Before starting the course, the course lecturer shall specify and declare which type of examination (written or oral) will take place.
 2. Courses assessed via continuous assessment, which are assessed according to the participants’ regular written and/or oral contributions. Before starting the course, the course lecturer shall specify and publish the assessment criteria.
- (4) The assessment of the final module Master’s Thesis Defence shall take place in form of an oral examination in front of an examination board of three examiners.

§ 10 Academic Degree

Graduates of the Master’s Programme Philosophy are awarded with the academic degree “Master of Arts”, abbreviated as “MA.”

§ 11 Coming into force

- (1) This curriculum comes into force on 1 October 2010.
- (2) The changes of the curriculum acc. to the University of Innsbruck Bulletin of 14 June 2016, Issue 40, No. 453 come into force on 1 October 2016 and are to be applied to all students.
- (3) The changes to the curriculum in the version of the University of Innsbruck Bulletin of 28. June 2019, Issue 69, No. 614 come into effect as of 1 October 2019 and are to be applied to all students.
- (4) § 7 para. 1 no 8 in the version of University of Innsbruck Bulletin of 25 May 2021, Issue 71, No. 798 come into effect as of 1 October 2021 and are to be applied to all students.

§ 12 Transitional provisions

- (1) Upon coming into force, degree students who started the Master’s Programme Philosophy before this curriculum came into force have the right to finish their studies within five semesters.
- (2) If they do not finish the former Master’s programme on time, the students become subject to this curriculum of the Master of Arts Programme Philosophy. Besides, they are entitled to volunteer for this curriculum at any earlier point in time.
