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§ 1 Classification of the study programme

According to §54 par. 1 of the Universities Act 2002 the Master's Programme Business Law is grouped among the jurisprudential study programmes.

§ 2 Qualification profile

The Master's Programme Business Law serves the scientific professional training of law students for economy and economy-related professions. Graduates of this study programme have an advanced legal knowledge with regards to contents and methodology as well as specific knowledge of business law and economic science. They are able to independently deal with demanding legal and economic problems based on legal methods of problem-solving. These advanced problem-solving skills acquired based on their university education enable them to work scientifically sound in all job fields related to business law, on national as well as international level. Because of the wide range and the depth of the legal knowledge acquired, the Master's Programme Business Law qualifies its graduates just like the Bachelor's Programme Business Law for further training in classic jobs in law, such as solicitor, lawyer, judge, federal prosecutor, administrative lawyer.

§ 3 Scope and duration

The Master's Programme Business Law covers 120 ECTS-Credits. This corresponds to a duration of four semesters. One ECTS-Credit corresponds to a work load of 25 hours.

§ 4 Admission

- (1) Admission to the Master's Programme Business Law requires a relevant Bachelor's degree awarded by a University or a University of Applied Sciences ("Fachhochschule") or a relevant degree acquired at a recognised post-secondary educational institution home or abroad.
- (2) A relevant Bachelor's programme is in any case the Bachelor's Programme in Business Law at the University of Innsbruck. The rectorate decides on study programmes in question or on the equivalence of a study programme passed at a post-secondary educational institution home or abroad for the admission to the Master's programme based on the regulations of the Universities
- (3) In the event that equivalence has been established in principle but with certain qualifications missing for full equivalence, supplemental examinations may be required by the rectorate. These examinations must be passed during the respective master's programme.

§ 5 Types of courses and maximum numbers of students per course

- (1) Courses without continuous performance assessment: **Lectures** (VO) are courses held in lecture format and courses without continuous performance assessment. They introduce the research areas, methods and schools of thought for a given subject.
- (2) Courses with continuous performance assessment:
 - 1. **Introductory seminars** (PS) introduce students interactively to scientific literature through the treatment of selected issues. They convey knowledge and methods of academic work. Maximum number of participants: 40
 - 2. **Seminars** (SE) provide in-depth treatment of scientific topics through students' presentations and discussion thereof. Maximum number of participants: 40
 - 3. **Lectures** with practical elements (VU) focus on the practical treatment of concrete scientific tasks that are discussed during the lecture parts of the course. Maximum number of participants: 160

§ 6 Allocation of places in courses with a limited number of participants

In courses with a limited number of participants, course places are allocated as follows:

- 1. Students for whom the study duration would be extended due to the postponement are to be given priority.
- 2. If the criterion in No. 1 does not suffice, first, students who pass this course as part of a compulsory module come first, then students that pass the course as part of an elective module.
- 3. If the criteria in No. 1 and No. 2 do not suffice, then the places are raffled.

§ 8 Master's Thesis

- (1) In the Master's programme a Master's Thesis corresponding to 20 ECTS-Credits must be written. The Master's Thesis is a scientific piece of work that proves the ability to work on a scientific topic independently and in a justifiable way in terms of content and methodology.
- (2) The topic for the Master's Thesis must come from the topical areas covered in compulsory modules 1 to 9 and/or elective modules 1 to 12. The topic is only allocated once the module, the topic is taken from, has been successfully completed.
- (3) Students are entitled to suggest a topic for their Master's Thesis or to select from a number of suggestions.
- (4) Students are entitled to write the Master's Thesis in a foreign language, if the supervisor agrees to it.
- (5) Several students can work on a topic, providing the possibility of evaluating the performance of the individual students.
- (6) A completed Master's Thesis must be evaluated within two months of its submission.

- (2) The performance of the Compulsory Module Private Law (§7 par. 1 no. 2) is evaluated
 - 1. by an overall oral examination of the subject matter of the courses of §7 par. 1 no. 2 lit. a–c,

- 2. by a course examination for the course of §7 par. 1 no. 2 lit. d.
- 3. The positive evaluation of the course acc. to §7 par. 1 no. 2 lit. d is no precondition for registering for the overall examination acc. to no. 1.
- (3) The performance of the Compulsory Module Civil Procedure Law (§7 par. 1. no 3) is evaluated by an oral overall exam on the subject matter of the module.
- (4) Course examinations are
 - 1. Examinations that assess the knowledge and skills covered by an individual course and where the performance is assessed by a single examination at the end of the course. The course lecturer must specify and communicate the examination method (written or oral) before the start of the course.
 - 2. Courses with continuous performance assessment, for which the performance assessment is based on regular written and/or oral contributions by the participants. The course lecturer must communicate the assessment criteria before the start of the course.
- (5) Overall examinations are examinations which serve the knowledge and skills acquired in more than one course of the module.
- (6) The course lecturers have to inform the students on the objectives, contents and methods of their courses as well as of the contents and methods, evaluation criteria and standards of the examinations in a suitable fashion before the start of each semester

§ 10 Academic degree

Graduates of the Master's Programme Business Law are awarded the academic degree "Master of Business Law", abbreviated "LL.M. (Wirtschaftsrecht)"

§ 11 Coming into force

- (1) This curriculum comes into force on 1 October 2016.
- (2) §7 par. 1 no. 8 lit. b, §7 par. 2 no. 12 lit. b and the annex in the version of the University of Innsbruck Bulletin of 30 May 2017, Issue 42, No. 590 come into effect on 1 October 2017 and are to be applied to all students.
