Origins of empire in the Middle East



The paper presents an overview on the emergence and early history of the phenomenon "empire" in the first millennium BCE in the Middle East. It covers a time frame from the 10th to the 2nd c. BCE and introduces the Neo Assyrian, Neo Babylon, and Persian empires, as well as the empires of Alexander the Great and the early successors. The presentation will offer a structural and comparative analysis of the origins of "empires" that appear for the first time in world history in this very region.

Robert Rollinger is Professor of Ancient History and Ancient Near Eastern Studies at the Leopold-Franzens University of Innsbruck. His main research areas are the history of the Ancient Near East and the Achaemenid Empire, contacts between the Aegean World and the Ancient Near East, and ancient historiography. Recent publications include: Imperien in der Weltgeschichte. Epochenübergreifende und globalhistorische Vergleiche (coedited; 2014); Mesopotamia in the Ancient World. Impact, Continuities, Parallels (coedited; 2015); Alexander und die großen Ströme. Die Flussüberquerungen im Lichte altorientalischer Pioniertechniken (2013).
