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Curriculum for the Continuing Education
Programme

**University Course: Community
Interpreting**

at the Faculty of Language, Literature and Culture of
the University of Innsbruck

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§1 Admission

- (1) Admission to the university course is decided by the director of the university course in the form of an admissions interview based on the participants' academic aptitude. If more than 25 people apply, the applicants to be admitted will be selected on the basis of previous education, motivation and a balanced composition of the group of participants.
- (2) Persons who have been admitted to the university course and have paid the course fee shall be admitted as non-degree students by the Rectorate of the University of Innsbruck.

§2 Qualification profile

Graduates have skills, techniques and methods of community interpreting and can apply these in their work with authorities, public institutions and organisations.

§3 Scope and duration

The university course covers 3 semester hours and 5 ECTS-Credits. One ECTS-Credit corresponds to a workload of 25 hours.

§4 Types of courses and maximum number of students per course

Courses with continuous performance evaluation:

Lecture-tutorials (VU) focus on the practical treatment of concrete scientific tasks that are discussed during the lecture parts of the course. Maximum number of students: 25.

§5 Compulsory module

The following compulsory module covering 5 ECTS-Credits is to be passed:

	Learning Outcomes: Students master the basics of interpreting and have the skills to practically apply various interpreting techniques and strategies in the context of community interpreting. They are able to carry out an interpreting assignment independently, including preparation and follow-up, invoicing and reflection. Students will be able to reflect on their role as a community interpreter and apply methods for resolving role conflicts and setting boundaries.

§6 Examination regulations

- (1) The performance evaluation of the module (module examination) is carried out by course examinations.
- (2) Course examinations serve to demonstrate the knowledge and skills imparted by an individual course, whereby in the courses with continuous performance evaluation the assessment is based on at least two written, oral and/or practical contributions by the participants.
- (3) The course instructor has to specify and announce the examination method (written and/or oral, exam paper) and the evaluation criteria before the start of the university course.

§7 Certificate of completion

Upon successful completion, graduates of the university course are issued with a certificate of completion.

§8 Coming into force

This curriculum comes into force on the first day of the month following its publication in the University of Innsbruck Bulletin.

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
