Master's Programme Comparative Literature

at the Faculty of Language, Literature and Culture of the University of Innsbruck

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§ 1 Allocation of the study programme

According to §54 par. 1 of the Universities' Act 2002, the Master's Programme Comparative Literature is allocated to the group of language, literature and culture studies.

§ 2 Qualification profile

- (1) Graduates of the Master's Programme Comparative Literature are specialists for independently and critically dealing with texts, literary and cultural theories, in relation to different literatures as well as in relation to phenomena of intermediality (inclusion of literary texts and others, in particular artistic and medial forms of expression of different cultures). They are also capable of independent interpretation of cultural phenomena and cultural mediation. Graduates have a broad but also highly specialised cultural knowledge and are able to work independently on their own scientific work. Graduates have the skills to organise their work efficiently, to access information quickly, to select it critically, to integrate knowledge from different areas, to develop their own theses and arguments and to formulate and pass them on in an appropriate way to find and pursue innovative research approaches.
- (2) Graduates are able to check the relevance of the scientific and theoretical knowledge and skills acquired during their study programme, also for possible fields of work. They have a critical awareness for questions of knowledge in a field and at the intersection to other fields.
 - Thereby they acquire the following key qualifications: competence in the field of reception, of interpretation and adaption of (literary) texts; in writing of demanding (scientific or other) texts; competence to convey one's own culture and to promote the understanding of other cultures and gender-specific differences; competence for interdisciplinary work as well as for designing organisational processes in social systems (information management, communicative competences, mediation competence in scientific, political, cultural and economic organisations), competence of managing and designing complex, unpredictable working or learning contexts requiring new strategic approaches. Graduates have an awareness for the gender dimension and are able to incorporate them by applying the above-mentioned competences.
- (3) Graduates of the Master's Programme Comparative Literature can apply their expertise in their field of work or study as well as knowledge from other disciplines for the strategic direction and management of complex projects, functional areas or companies. The Master's Programme Comparative Literature enables them to take responsibility for contributing to the expertise and professional practice and/or reviewing the strategic performance of teams. Possible fields of work: Specialist scientists at universities and non-university institutions (e.g. museums, academies, surveying, specialised publishing houses); publishing - media (contract editorial work; writing specialist books; editorial work and publishing in the field of print media, in particular specialist magazines and newspapers, but also at radio and TV stations and in all new media; PR-agencies; art and culture journalism); archives and (specialist) libraries; educational policy and public relations (advising in politics and economy; adult education, librarianship); cultural politics, administration and mediation (project management for museums and exhibitions; advising for management and (cultural) policy; organisational and administrative tasks in public and private institutions and organisations [cultural management]; theatre (dramaturgy); lectorship abroad, cultural work in Austrian representations abroad, tasks in (cultural) institutions (EU, UNO).
- (4) The Master's Programme Comparative Literature is the basis for a Doctoral Programme.

§ 3 Scope and duration

The Master's Programme English and American Studies covers 120 ECTS-Credits. This corresponds to a study duration of four semesters. One ECTS-Credit corresponds to a workload of 25 hours.

§ 4 Admission

- (1) Admission to the Master's Programme requires the completion of a subject-specific Bachelor's Programme or a subject-specific Bachelor's Programme at a University of Applied Sciences or another comparable study programme at an approved post-secondary educational institution home or abroad.
- (2) In any case, the Bachelor's Programme Comparative Literature or another Bachelor's Programme at the Faculty of Language, Literature and Culture of the University of Innsbruck are considered relevant study programmes. The rectorate decides, according to the Universities' Act, on study programmes in question or on the equivalence of a study programme passed at a post-secondary educational institution home or abroad for the admission to the Master's programme.
- (3) In the event that equivalence has been established in principle but with certain qualifications missing for full equivalence, supplemental examinations may be required by the rectorate. These examinations must be passed during the respective master's programme.

§ 5 Types of courses and maximum number of participants

Courses with continuous performance assessment:

- 1. **Practical courses** (UE) focus on the practical treatment of concrete scientific tasks within an area. Maximum number of participants: 30.
- 2. **Seminars** (SE) provide in-depth treatment of scientific topics through students' presentations and discussion thereof. Maximum number of participants: 30.
- 3. **Lectures with practical elements** (VU) focus on the practical treatment of concrete scientific tasks that are discussed during the lecture parts of the course. Maximum number of participants: 30.
- 4. **Excursions** (EX), conducted outside the premises of the university, serve to demonstrate and deepen course contents. Maximum number of participants: 20.

§ 6 Allocation of places in courses with a limited number of participants

In courses with a limited number of participants, course places are allocated as follows:

- 1. Students for whom the study duration would be extended due to the postponement are to be given priority.
- 2. If criterion no. 1 does not suffice for regulating the admission, then first, students for whom the course is part of a compulsory module are to be given priority, and second, students for whom the course is part of an elective module.
- 3. If the criteria in no. 1 and 2 do not suffice for regulating the admission, then the available places are raffled.

§ 7 Compulsory and elective modules

4. Individual Choice of Specialisation (maximum of 20 ECTS-Credits):

For individual specialisation modules corresponding to a maximum of 20 ECTS-Credits can be freely chosen from the Master's Programmes offered at the University of Innsbruck acc. to §54 par. 1 of the Universities' Act. The prerequisites specified in the respective curricula must be met.

§ 8 Master's Thesis

- (1) In the Master's Programme a **Master's Thesis** amounting to **25 ECTS-Credits** must be written. The Master's Thesis is a scientific piece of work that proves the ability to work on a scientific topic independently and in a justifiable way in terms of content and methodology.
- (2) The topic of the Master's Thesis must be taken from the compulsory modules of the curriculum.
- (3) Students have the right to suggest the topic for their Master's Thesis or to select from a number of suggestions.
- (4) The students are entitled to write the Master's Thesis in a foreign language if the supervisor agrees to it
- (5) Several students may work on a topic together, if it is possible to evaluate the contributions of the individual students.

§ 9 Examination regulations

- (1) Courses with continuous assessment, are courses for which course assessment is based on regular written and/or oral contributions by participants.
- (2) The course instructor has to inform the students on the objectives, contents and methods, as well as the contents, methods and evaluation criteria of the course examinations in a suitable manner before the start of the course.
- (3) The elective modules "Practice" are evaluated by the Director of Studies. Positive evaluation read "participated with success", negative valuation "participated without success".
- (4) The compulsory module "Master's Thesis Defense" is evaluated by an oral examination before an examination board. The examination board consists of three persons.

§ 10 Academic degree

The graduates of the Master's Programme Comparative Literature are awarded the academic degree of "Master of Arts", abbreviated "MA".

§ 11 Coming into force

- (1) This curriculum comes into force as of 1 October 2009.
- (2) The changes to the curriculum in the version of the University of Innsbruck Bulletin of 25 April 2018, Issue 28, No. 319 come into effect as of 1 October 2018 and are to be applied to all students.
