Plantinga on Warrant and Proper Function

What is knowledge? Echoing Aristotle, Aquinas and Descartes, Alvin Plantinga of Notre Dame argues we have knowledge of the world when our cognitive capacities have the proper function of representing the world, have a good design plan, are functioning properly, and are in normal conditions. What is it to have a proper function and to function properly, and why should this matter to knowledge? Plantinga turns to intentional design, holding in part that functions can only arise from non-natural sources. This paper explains why Plantinga's doubts fall short, and explains why natural functions can explain our knowledge.

Peter Graham is Associate Dean for Arts and Humanities and Professor of Philosophy and Linguistics at the University of California, Riverside (UCR). He is Associate Editor of the *Journal of the American Philosophical Association* and has held visiting positions in Canada, South Korea, England and Scotland. Peter



Graham is currently visiting the Cologne Center for Contemporary Epistemology in the Kantian Tradition. He has published numerous articles and books, and is the co-editor of *Epistemic Entitlement* (Oxford University Press) and the *Routledge Handbook of Social Epistemology* (Routledge). His research in epistemology and social epistemology deals with questions surrounding perception and knowledge through testimony; his current research interests focus on the role of functional explanations in perceptual psychology, reasoning, and the flow of information through communication.
