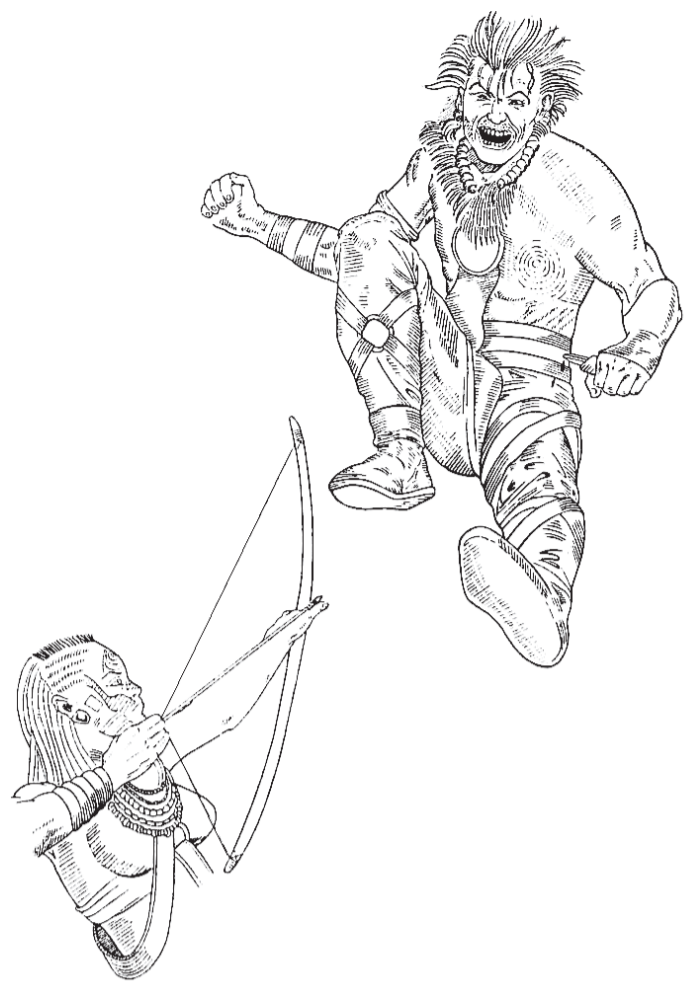

A short history of the archaeology of war: theoretical items and new perspectives

The lesson deals with the recent developments of a “branch” of archaeological theory that received a decisive input from the interethnic wars of the late XX century in the Balkan peninsula.

The tragic reality of a war in Europe after more than 50 years of peace and, at the same time, the growing interest, in the field of post-processual archaeology, for gender studies, were the catalyst for a real explosion of interest in the archaeology of war.

Obviously the major results were achieved in countries where the military studies are deeply rooted in local culture, like the United Kingdom. Also the developments in other European countries and in the United States will be examined; last, but not least, the Italian scene will be described.

Alessandro Guidi is Full Professor of Prehistory in Roma Tre University from 2008. He made researches on the protohistory of middle Thyrrenian area directing survey and excavation projects and organizing museums and exhibitions; from 1981 to 1993 he directed the archaeological excavation of the protohistorical and archaic settlement of Cures Sabini (Fara Sabina, Rieti); from 2000 to 2007 he directed surveys and excavations in the protohistorical Venetic settlement of Oppeano (VR); from 2009 he co-directs with Alessandro Jaia (Roma-La Sapienza) and Gabriele Cifani (Roma-Tor Vergata) survey and excavations at Colle Rotondo (Anzio, RM).

He gave conferences and participated to congresses in Italy, France, United Kingdom, Denmark, Sweden, Spain, Germany, Netherlands, Poland, United States and India.
