Zum Thema:

Monetary obligations have traditionally found their regulation – if and where expressly disciplined– in domestic legislation (i.e. civil codes, specific statutes, case law in the Common law tradition). Comparative law has long focused on similarities and differences in the structure of these obligations and on the construction that national Courts have adopted in specific historical and economic conjunctures. The impact that EU law has had on these obligations, especially after the introduction of the euro, is visible in different domains that range from a common regulation for delay (i.e. the Directives on combating late payments) to the adoption of rules for payment systems (i.e. Payment System Directives). The result is a corpus of European private law norms that whilst providing common rules for some aspects of these obligations, leaves other domains under competence of (a variety of) domestic rules. The lecture will first concentrate on a comparative excursus on national sources and then try to assess the impact of EU legislation and its effects on the very notion of “monetary obligations”.

Zur Vortragenden:

Noah Vardi is Associate Professor of Private Comparative Law. She graduated summa cum laude at the University of Roma Tre Law School in 2001 and obtained her PhD in European Private Law at the University of Verona. She became a Lecturer in Private Comparative Law at the University of Roma Tre in 2005 and was Fulbright Visiting Scholar at the Yale Law School and Visiting Scholar at the Max Planck Institut für Ausländisches und Internationales Privatrecht in Hamburg. She has taught several courses and seminars in Universities both in Italy and abroad and currently teaches Private Comparative Law and Comparative Legal Systems at the University of Roma Tre. Her main fields of research include private comparative law, European private law, financial markets and monetary law, payment systems. She has published a book on “The Integration of European Financial Markets: The regulation of monetary obligations “ (Routledge, 2010), and has authored several articles on these topics.
